RESPECT

Priority 1: Cost of the School Day

A low indicative spend (£1k—£5k) will be allocated to ensure that the school will have an extensive uniform bank including pre-loved and new items. All school social events/activities/trips/ excursions will be funded by the school as far as possible and any costs kept to a minimum (extra-curricular will be at no cost throughout the session) and target groups will be fully supported to attend/participate/achieve. Increased attendance of target groups of young people at social events and school clubs/activities is an area of focus. Further provision is in place to support our daily breakfast club.

Priority 2: Supporting & Improving Attendance

An Advanced Pupil Support Worker will be allocated additional hours to continue in a role to support targeted attendance and family support. Young people and families entitled to and in receipt of FSM will be supported by in-school initiatives and regular family support opportunities will be provided. Family learning events focused to further support attendance of this target group of families/young people will be offered.

KINDNESS

Priority 3: Engagement & Participation of Care Experienced Young People (CECYP)

100% of CECYP contribute to the school and all decision making processes. All CECYP participate and engage in school and the wider life and ethos. A mentoring group to support CECYP and families is in place and a CECYP school lead is identified to ensure/support their success (attendance, achievement, attainment and participation).

Priority 4: Literacy

Support for Learning and Pupil Support focus on targeted interventions to support and challenge young people as appropriate to improve literacy (particularly reading and writing) achievement. In addition to targeted in class support, interventions will be in place to support target groups of young people.

Priority 5: Numeracy

Support for Learning, PEF leads and Pupil Support will work in partnership with Maths staff to support numeracy improvement of target groups in class and through appropriate interventions. Family learning events designed to provide help for families to support numeracy improvement will be offered.

Participatory Budgeting

Young people will attend outdoor learning and out of school 'adventure' experiences to develop their health and well-being and critical meta-skills including self-belief, courage, relationship building, teamwork and collaboration. This includes supporting funding for a residential experience for targeted young people in \$2 and an activities week in \$1.
